Jonathan Recognized for Community Building Efforts

The Minnesota Chapter of the nationwide Community Associations Institute (CAI-MN) held its 2012 Vision Awards ceremony on June 7, 2012 at the International Market Square in Minneapolis. More than 750 industry professionals and volunteers were in attendance. Jonathan in Chaska, the largest homeowners association in Minnesota, was recognized by the CAI-MN with the award for "Outstanding Community Building by an Association" for its efforts in 2011. Representing Jonathan were current president David Snodgrass and

former president Nate Bostrom. In an effort to create strong local neighborhoods, the Jonathan Association provides annual community-building events like the Festival of Garage Sales, Fourth of July Fun Run, Kiddie Parade & Family Celebration, National Night Out neighborhood picnics with antique fire truck rides, a Hog Roast for Boy Scout Troop 589, and the Cocoa & Coasting Sledding Party. The CAI-MN panel of judges noted that Jonathan builds a strong sense of community-connectedness by publishing a 20-page quarterly newsletter named "Jonathan Neighbors". This publication received a MarCom "Gold Award" from the Association of Marketing and Communication Professionals in 2011.

Jonathan was also commended for providing high-quality and fun-to-read "Event Reminder Postcards" for upcoming social events via postal mail delivery for the convenience of the 8,000 residents who live in the nearly 3,000 homes in the Association's 23 neighborhoods. As recently as 2010 Jonathan in Chaska was named "Homeowner Association of the Year" by the CAI-MN Chapter.

With the cooler days of Fall and Winter, many residents will continue to get out and exercise! The Chaska Police Department reminds you to do so safely. Here are a few tips to achieve a safe experience:



cross country ski, always let someone know where you are going and when you expect to be back. Consider bringing a friend!

- Take your cell phone with you. If you are injured or see something suspicious, you will be able to call for help.
- Stay aware. While using iPods and MP3 players, some people "zone out" while exercising. Always be aware of your surroundings. If you are aware of your surroundings, you are less likely to be targeted and victimized.
- If exercising at night, only use well lit and traveled paths. You may have to alter your normal routine in exchange for the safest path. Try to incorporate reflective clothing or bring a flashlight with you. This way others will see you, especially if running on a roadway. If biking, it's the law to have a light on the bike.
- If you carry personal protection such as pepper spray, it is a must that it be carried in your hand. If you encounter trouble, there will be no time to "look for it" after the fact.
- The Chaska Police encourage residents to call 911 to report any suspicious activity.

Chaska is an extremely safe community, but using the above safety tips can help make it even safer. The Chaska Police Department encourages you to exercise safely and enjoy the outdoors!



A Run for the Records—Jonathan July 4th Fun Run

Eighty-seven (87) degrees at the 8:30 a.m. start. Seventy percent humidity. An expected daytime high of 100 degrees. A mid-week holiday. Yet 103 runners and walkers of all ages braved the heat, humidity, and distance on the 5K/3.1 mile course, and the winning time of 19:34 was earned by a runner pushing a



stroller with infant! Definitely a 'Run for the Records'!

Every Jonathan July 4th Fun Run is different. Many attendees make this event an annual tradition. some from outside Jonathan. About one-third returned from last year.

There was

different weather and attendees this year, but no difference in the course; not this year or since a 2008 reroute with Lake Grace lakefront trail reconstruction. As in the past 3 years, the all-paved Jonathan 5K/3.1 mile route started at the south edge of the Jonathan Kindergarten Center parking lot, looped the lot, and then threaded behind the south playground and under Village Road to the Center Green tot lot split. From there, the route climbed gradually north behind Neighborhood One North, Center Green, and the Waybury Apartments to the Barbary Knoll tot lot, then curled north and east through the backyards of Jonathan Acres and Millpond Court, under Pioneer Trail, and into McKnight Park. In McKnight Park, the course skirted the main parking lot and shelter before diving into the woods to its northernmost point, then curved

sharply south to follow the west bank of Lake Jonathan and Lake Grace to the beach and pavilion. Continuing south, the course followed East Chaska Creek through the woods, under Hundertmark Road, then west behind the Jonathan Montessori Center at its southernmost point. From there, the course steered north for the brutal late-run climb behind Stone Creek, Aspen Oaks, Stockwood, and Neighborhood One South to the Center Green tot lot split, then ended with a short route retrace to the Kindergarten Center finish. Although this event is billed as a fun run, times of the first three men and women are recorded, and times are announced for all at the finish. The fastest



time and first-place finish men for the 5K was earned by Kurt Wood in 19 minutes and 34 seconds (even though son Sebastian crossed the finish (and start) a split second before in the stroller). James Howard returned this year and finished second in 22:26, and Jason Branch finished third in 23:51. Alanna Lee finished first of women with a time of 24 minutes and 17 seconds, followed shortly by Ann Lendino second in 24:52 and Sara Honsa third in 25:09. The city of Chaska website has a listing of city ordinances and some of the issues mentioned above would be in violation, therefore, notify the Chaska police. They

will follow up and in many instances issue a citation or several to that homeowner, and in some cases, it can lead to an arrest for unpaid tickets, etc. If nothing is done, than the issue will not go away or even have a chance to improve. So do yourself and your neighbors a favor, call the police - 952.448.4200.

The Jonathan Association is Minnesota's largest homeowners association and its sole responsibility is maintaining Jonathan's common properties or grounds – see list on page 13. The Jonathan office has and does send letters, as a courtesy, to those homeowners brought to our attention or noticed on drive-bys. All vehicles must be parked on the driveway; nothing can be parked on lawns. Residents may construct driveway extensions to accommodate their recreational vehicles. Residents may contact the Karen House to get a copy of the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) Guidelines or print from our website at www.jonathaninchaska.com. Specs and requirements are outlined in those documents. For approval, ARC only requires a sketch of the location of the driveway extension as it relates to, and connects with, the existing driveway; distance from the lot line; and notation of material used.





In the middle of the night, the building was lifted onto a huge truck trailer and driven the two blocks south to its current location. A subsequent building addition expanded the original school to its current size.

Seeing the need to expand the Jonathan Montessori curriculum beyond pre-school, the World Learner School was formed as a separate entity to be a free, non-profit, public charter school program to educate children in grades 1-8.

Both schools offer a high quality educational option for residents of Jonathan with plans to offer a toddler program (16 months) starting in 2013.

Blast from the Past: JONATHAN MONTESSORI -A 42 YEAR JONATHAN TRADITION by Marsh Halberg

The Schools Expand

If you've driven down Hundertmark Road in the last few months, you've seen big changes going on for the Jonathan Montessori School and the World Learner School. For years the two programs have been sharing their facility at Hundertmark Road and Village Road. With both programs needing more space, the Montessori school purchased the former Living Hope Church/St.



Andrews West Church located next door, remodeled the building and moved in to open this school year. The World Learner School now enjoys use of the entire original school building.

An Interesting History

When the planned community of Jonathan started in the early 1970's, it's designers hoped to develop a total community and that also encompassed issues such as childcare. Remember that in the early 1970's women were still transitioning to

working outside the home and the need for childcare was growing.

In planning our community, the Jonathan Development Corporation remodeled an old barn (the original Worm Barn located next to the Karen House) so the lower level could serve as a Montessori school. The Jonathan Montessori School, an authentic Montessori program, opened in 1971 based upon the teachings of Maria Montessori to provide a safe environment for children to learn.

The Worm Barn Fire

The school continued in a comfort zone until May 7, 1989 when everything changed. On that



weekend, small children unconnected to the school pulled up a piece of the barn siding and, playing with matches, accidentally set the barn on fire. A huge crowd gathered to watch as the entire building burned to the around.

The school was left without a home or equipment and their future existence was in great doubt. The parents of the school, lead by school director Randi Shapiro, rallied and were determined to rebuild. For the next year, the school was based out of several parents' homes, which allowed time for formulating a business plan.

Buying a Building for \$1

After the fire the school started looking for a new space and found an opportunity right in Jonathan. The original Jonathan sales office building stood vacant on the space that is now the Jonathan Square shopping area. The building was set to be bulldozed for the new shopping development. A loan backed by a special federal program allowed the school to buy the building for \$1 and to then purchase the land parcel at Hundertmark and Village Road. Cont. on pg. 13

Jonathan Hosts Architectural Tour

A diverse group of approximately 30 aspiring architectural and engineering students of high school and college age toured the Jonathan Association on July 16, 2012. The tour originated at the Karen House and included: the Red Cedar/Idea House on Kinas Lane, the Trail Head Park, the Children Playing Monument, the "tree house apartments" of Aspen Oaks, various homes on Stanford Circle and Olin Court, Jonathan General Store, ISD 112 Kindergarten Center, and concluded with a picnic at the Lake Grace beach.

Hailing from East St. Paul, the students were making their very first visit to the southwest metro area. "Our students came a long way from home but it was worth the trip," said John Stangl, a college instructor and the event's organizer. "The kids really enjoyed the sights and history of Jonathan."

Nate Bostrom, former Jonathan president and current member of the Association's Heritage Committee, conducted the tour. "The students come from inner city neighborhoods and were especially intrigued by the trail system," said Bostrom. "I floated the idea of calling the trails 'people roads' and that proved to be a very popular decision!"

The participating students are affiliated with either Century College of White Bear Lake, or a variety of St. Paul area high schools, and the tour of Jonathan was an event organized under the auspices of TRIO Upward Bound.

"The Children Playing monument held the students' interest for a long time," reported Bostrom. "Although I think they preferred the informal name of 'Dinosaur Bones' instead."

"The kids loved the tree house apartments and took lots of photos of the house designed by Ralph Rapson," reported Stangl. "We

required them to study the history section on the Jonathan website and they were very impressed that a rich and powerful leader like Henry McKnight would create a diverse place where everyone could find a home."



Jonathan is managed by Gassen Companies, which provides professional property management services to homeowner associations in 15 Minnesota counties. The Gassen organization was formed in 1969 and is accredited with the Better Business Bureau.

George Bender was the first local farmer to sell his property to the "New Town" of Jonathan. His grandfather, Christian



In May 1972, Secretary of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) George Romney visited Jonathan to inspect the progress of HUD's "New Communities" Program in Minnesota's first New Town. A Jonathan apple tree was planted to commemorate the visit. George Romney was the former governor of Michigan, and his son Mitt Romney was elected governor of Massachusetts some thirty years later and went on to be a Presidential candidate in 2012.

Kathleen "Kacie" Brown, born in December 1969 was the very first "native born" Jonathan citizen. Kacie's parents, Bill and Maggie Brown, had moved into Jonathan in October 1968. The Browns were Jonathan's first residential
